## SEFTON HARRIERS VICTORIOUS.

#### TENNANT AGAIN THE WINNER.

Since its inauguration in 1892 the annual contest for the (Liverpool and District Cross Country Championship has steadily increased in public favour, whilst the association itself receives year by year proof of its popularity with local harrier clubs by increased membership. This year fourteen clubs entered, and all sent teams to compete, the total number of runners being 150. The venue, as usual, was the pretty Deeside village of Parkgate, the race taking place on the old Wirral Hunt Steeple Chase course, an ideal spot for the purpose. Additional interest was lent to this year's contest owing to the fact that the Northern Cross Country champion, J. Hosker (Farnworth Harriers) would endeavour to wrest the individual championship from J. Tennant (West Cheshire). Last year, Hosker ran second to Tennant, but in the "Northern" Tennant was a long way astern of the Farnworth Harrier. It has transpired, however, that Tennant put his big toe out in that race, but as he came fit and well to the post on Saturday his friends greatly fancied his chance, however, it unfortunately so happened that Hosker had been suffering from influenza since his Northern victory, and though he pluckily turned out he ran very listlessly, and was forced to retire at half distance. As regards the clubs, Farnworth (the holders) were mostly fancied, whilst West Cheshire and Sefton had many friends, none of the other clubs having an "earthly". The story of the race is soon told, as from "the outset" Tennant drew away, and increasing his lead, each lap eventually won by 400 yards, covering the distance (nearly eight miles) in 47 min. 55 sec. He was followed home by Rimmer of Liverpool and the veteran runner Geo. Wright, of Widnes, a member of the Farnworth H. As man after man rolled up it was seen that it would be a very close thing between the three fancied clubs, and so it proved, as after a patient scrutiny it was found that the Sefton Harriers had won by two points only from Farnworth, whilst West Cheshire Harriers were but three more points behind.
