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




Further details of the membership card showing the names of the Hierarchy and champions of the club at the time many of whom I am sure Charlie knew very well and often competed with.



complete his career with the Birkonians, with whom he appeared destined to secure another League medal, as they were an easy first in the League when the declaration of war neces-sitated the suspension of all competitions. In open competition he has been a consistent performer, and quite a score of prizes bear witness to his provess at either the trudgeon or breas, stroke. In his opening year he scored a couple of second prizes. In 1994 he took a third in an open scratch breast stroke race at Bootle, and in 1807 he occupied a similar position in a 100 yards rescue race at Liverpool Tramway S.C. gala, the winner being George Matthews, the King's Cup winner, and the second H. E. Humphreys, the Olympic swimmer.

The walking craze of 1903 saw him a mem-ber of Sefton Harriers, and he early forged to the front as a "ped." He finished third in the New Ferry-Wrexham 25 miles, in which event only two minutes separated the first three home. In the Cheshire All-England 50 miles he finished 5th in 8h. 25min. 40-sec., and took second prize in the sealed handicap. Added successes were his portion in the Swimmers' Walk (17 miles), Bradford (451 miles), Hull (20 miles), Leicester (22 miles), and Manchester to Blackpool (512 miles).

Running Exploits.

Running was Howarth's particular forte. For four years he was captain of Pembroke Harriers, and is at present captain of the Selton pack, being decidedly popular with the fraternity, and "hail fellow, well met" with with ar

His prizes in this branch are almost too numerous to mention, including, as they do, tangible proof of his prowess at all distances from 100 yards to Marathen distance principal amongst them being: Newton le Willows, 2nd, mile: Liverpool Corporation, 1st, mile; Pres-oot, 3rd, ½-mile; Sefton Harriers, 3rd, mile; Bangor, 3rd, ½-mile; Formby, 1st, mile; New Brighton, 2nd, mile: Liverpool Corporation, 1st, mile; Holyhead, 1st, mile and 2nd ½-mile; Woolton, 1st, 220: Holyhead, 2nd, obstacle; N.A.U. Mile Break, 3rd; Pembroke Harriers, 1st in the 3 miles (three times) and seven milee; N.A.U. seven miles, 1st; and was placed second in the Club Championship 10 Miles in 1912.


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
In my collection of memorabilia I have found a couple of Sefton and Pembroke Harriers Programmes for some of their events




